Ultimately, my photography passion has helped me develop a unique perspective as an architect. By blending these two disciplines, I can create spaces that are functional, visually stunning, and memorable.

My work demonstrates a deep understanding of light, space, and form interplay. Each project is approached with a sense of curiosity and experimentation.



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


What Is A Photo? What Is A Building?

With that being said, the next few slides will step out of the realm of Classical Architectural Photography and into the experimentation of Architecture as a whole, please join me.




What Is A Photo? What Is A Building?



If We Mirror The Stairs 4 Times To Create A New Stair, Is It The Same Building?


















What does Chicago look like with a Teal Sky?




